

An annual highlight for our P5 Woodgrovians, the Internationalisation Programme exposes them to Asia and provides an opportunity for them to learn and interact with their peers in Asia, while deepening their commitment and rootedness to Singapore. This year, our P5 Woodgrovians embarked on a virtual learning journey to China. The educational experience enabled our Woodgrovians to "visit" the various provinces in China and learn about its people, residences, architecture, and its history. 
#### **Gratitude Series**



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
